## General Information

1. The intent of Sea Scout and Venturing Officer Association (SSVOA) events is to promote Sea Scouting and Venturing by providing programming for young adults. All participants should be a registered Venturer, Sea Scout or Explorer. Older Scouts who are interested in attending are encouraged to dual register in a Ship or Crew.
2. All Scouts should adhere to the Scout Oath and Scout Law as the rules governing their behavior on camp property.
3. Make sure parents/guardians know the crew/ship number, and the name of unit leader(s) in attendance.
4. The use of mind-altering substances (including alcoholic beverages) by adult or youth members will result in the immediate dismissal from the event site. Parents will be notified to come and pick up their scout.
5. Smoking/ Vaping is only allowed in the main Parking lot at Camp Boddie. Smoking in the bathrooms, on trails, or in campsites is not allowed! Unit leaders please inform parents and other leaders.
6. Showing of Affection- This is a scouting event and it is understood that we are dealing with young adults who may become romantically interested in each other. Youth and adults should refrain from signs of affection such as kissing, hugging, holding hands or sitting on top of each other and other inappropriate behavior that may make others uncomfortable.
7. All vehicles must remain on roads; do not drive or park on the grass. Vehicles may be parked near camp site to unload but then must be parked in designated parking area. Special exceptions for medical reasons can be made with prior approval of the Camp Chair.
8. All Ships and Crews should have 2 registered adult leaders in attendance. If you have females in your unit, one leader must be a female. All adult leaders will camp with their Crew/Ships. If a unit is unable to provide qualified adult leadership they may buddy-up with another unit. This should be coordinated prior to arriving at the event.
9. Venturing Crews, Explorer Posts, Sea Scout Ships, and STEM Scouts are encouraged to attend and participate in all Camporee Events. Crews are also encouraged to camp in the areas in order to promote Venturing.
10. All Scouts will remain on the Sea Base area/Shooting Sports area throughout the event. If there are compelling reasons or emergencies for leaving, permission must be secured through unit leadership and SSVOA leadership.
11. Scouts should use the “buddy system” when outside their assigned area. During the events on Saturday, an activity uniform may be worn. Scouts should dress “clean & appropriate” in a unit activity uniform. Shoes should be sneaker type boots, or leather shoes. For safety reasons NO SANDALS or open-toed shoes will be allowed.
12. All meals will be hosted by Ship 1117. There will be no need for units to cook on their own.

- An area will be provided for the Saturday evening Dutch Oven Dessert Contest.
13. Please set up campsite with Leave No Trace and Tread Lightly. Principles in mind
  14. Troops will furnish their own garbage bags and properly dispose of them. We will coordinate a trash run to the dumpsters at Camp Boddie on Sunday morning.
  15. Approved lanterns may be used in campsites. Only electric lanterns or flashlights are to be used outside the unit site. Generators will not be permitted on the grounds for units without council executive approval.
  16. Swimming in the Pamlico River is strictly forbidden by scouts or adults. This includes wading in the river.
  17. Units are encouraged to bring unit flags and burgees and used to mark unit sites. A personal or unit water craft will not be used during the event period without prior approval and coordination.
  18. The national flag will be hoisted and lowered at a formal ceremony on Saturday and Sunday.
  19. Council Event Insurance covers accidents only and has a deductible. It does not cover normal sickness.
  20. All persons/guests are required to register at the Camp Office located in Area HQ.

FEE REFUND POLICY: All refund requests must be made in writing and mailed to the East Carolina Council Office. Any requests for refunds on 'no shows' will not be honored. Refund requests for Scouts or Parents that depart early from camp will not be honored.

MEDICAL FORMS: All Camporee participants are required to complete and submit an Annual Health and Medical form. Area Chiefs may ask units to see the Medical Forms and retain the right to remove a unit from camp if forms are not complete. This is the new A&B form on the newly released medical form. (A doctor's signature is not required for this event). The Medical form can be found on the East Carolina Council website under "BSA Forms".

### **ARRIVAL AT Sea Base:**

LEADERS' MEETING: Unit youth leaders and advisors will meet at 8:00 pm Friday night at HQ. Scoutmaster/SPL (or designee) meeting at 9:30pm at Camp HQ. Make sure that your unit is represented at the leader's meeting to get important information about Saturday's activities by both a Scout leader and the Senior Patrol Leader. Please limit participation to 4 people per unit.

FLAGS: Each Unit is requested to bring their Unit Flag to the Event and display them in their campsites. We ask that you also bring your unit flags to the Flag Ceremony on Saturday morning.

UNIFORMS: Scouts should wear their Class A Field Uniform to morning and evening meals and formations . Scouting T-shirts/Class B/Activity Uniform, are to be worn for activities throughout Saturday. OA Members are requested to wear their sash at campfire.

## First Aid/CPR/AED Training

This event is the American Red Cross Adult and Pediatric First Aid/CPR/AED (revision 2021) Blended Learning course. Updated in December 2021, this course provides participants with the knowledge and skills they need to recognize and respond appropriately to cardiac, breathing, and first aid emergencies for Adults, Youth, and Infants. This course consists of two parts: independent online learning and an instructor led skills session. To complete the course requirements each participant must complete the online learning segment and demonstrate their ability to complete all required skills without coaching or assistance during the skills assessment scenarios. Upon meeting the criteria for course completion and demonstration of competency, participants will receive a 2-year American Red Cross certification.

Based on the number of registered participants, and to allow for flexibility, skill sessions will be offered throughout the day on Saturday, 15 January 2022. Participants can only attend one skill session.

This course will be conducted in accordance with the more stringent of either East Carolina Council's or the American Red Cross' COVID-19 policies current at the time of the instructor led skills session. At a minimum, each participant will receive their own student training kit, and each manikin will be sanitized following American Red Cross' current manikin decontamination and use procedures and have its lung bag changed between participant use.

### **PRE-EVENT**                      **Varies by participant**

Upon notification of registration each participant will be officially enrolled in the existing course by the instructor and forwarded a unique registration link to the email provided at the time of registration. This link will allow the participant to complete the required online learning portion of this course, which should take about 3 hours 30 minutes to complete – time will vary by participant and participant's internet connection speed. This portion **MUST** be completed prior to arrival at camp to participate in the instructor led Skills Session.

## SEA SCOUT MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM

Approved October 2013



This award for Sea Scouts has been implemented as a part of the special activities a Sea Scout can participate in during times when they are not engaged in their nautical programs. It is designed to give programming for the ship when they are not able to get on the water, as extracurricular program.

A Sea Scout would begin with the Basic Shooter requirements. He or she chooses which discipline or disciplines they would like to participate in. Note that they can choose to learn how to shoot more than one firearm.

A special “Sea Scout Shooting Sports Medal” is being designed to be earned after a Sea Scout earns their first level, no matter what discipline they shoot. From the main medal, we would have small medal bars that would hang off of this original medal. The bar would state what the discipline is they shot and the level they are currently at. For an example, there would be 4 Bars for each discipline – i.e.: Rifle –Basic, Intermediate, Advanced, and Expert. Each discipline would have these 4 bars. The Sea Scout would only wear the bar for the highest level they have achieved. If the Sea Scout shoots all 3 disciplines, they could only have a maximum of 3 bars hanging off of their medal showing the highest level achieved for each discipline.

### **Basic Shooter**

Complete one of the following discipline requirements. (Note that the requirements can be completed in more than one discipline if a Sea Scout wants to learn to shoot more than one type of firearm.)

#### **Rifle – Complete the following requirements:**

- Basic Shooter program for rifle shooting.
- Using a .22 caliber rimfire rifle, and shooting from the benchrest position at 50 feet, fire five groups (three shots per group) that can be covered by a quarter. Using these targets, explain how to adjust the sights to zero a rifle.

#### **Shotgun –Complete the following requirements:**

- Basic Shooter program for shotgun shooting
- Using a 20 or 12 gauge shotgun, hit 11 or more out of 25 targets in one 25-target group.

### **Intermediate Shooter**

Complete the following requirements for the discipline or disciplines you are shooting from the previous level.

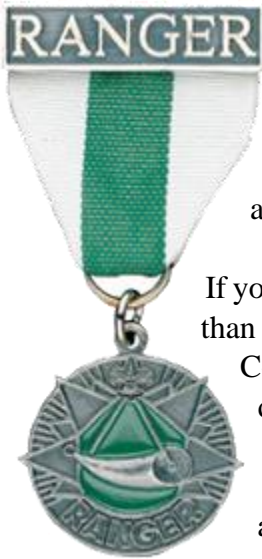
**Rifle – Complete the following requirements:**

- Complete the NRA Basic Course for rifle shooting
- Using a .22 caliber rimfire rifle, A-17 or A-32 target, and shooting from the prone or benchrest position at 50 feet, fire 2 rounds of 20 shots in each round scoring a minimum score of 100 out of a possible 200 points in each round. \*Note that by achieving this score, the Sea Scout has also earned the Pro-Marksman level in the Winchester/NRA Marksmanship Qualification program for Rimfire Rifle Prone/Benchrest shooting and would be eligible for their award.

**•Shotgun – Complete the following requirements:**

- Complete the NRA Basic Course for shotgun shooting.
- Using a 20 or 12 gauge shotgun, Trap or Skeet Course, hit 11 or more out of 25 targets two times. \*Note that by achieving this score, the Sea Scout has also earned the Pro-Marksman level in the Winchester/NRA Marksmanship Qualification program for Shotgun Qualification.

## Ranger Award Shooting Sports Elective



General knowledge

Recite, explain, and demonstrate the three primary shooting safety rules.

Recite and explain the range commands.

Identify the parts of a rifle and explain the function of those parts.

If you chose small-bore rifle for your shooting discipline, explain how "minute of angle" is used to "zero" the firearm.

If you chose shotgun as your shooting discipline, explain how you sight a shotgun differently than you would a rifle.

Complete a basic training course and the course of fire for one of the following shooting disciplines: i, ii, iii, iv, v, vi, or vii.

For this elective, shooting must be under the supervision of a certified instructor/coach and with equipment approved by that instructor.

### **Shotgun:**

Break 25 clay birds of a possible 50 on a skeet course and 25 clay birds of a possible 50 on a trap course.

OR

Break 50 clay birds of a possible 100 on a skeet course.

OR

Break 50 clay birds of a possible 100 on a trap course.

### **Small Bore Rifle**

Porter Course: Using six A17 targets, shoot one shot at each record bull from a distance of 50 feet for a total of 60 shots. Of the 60 shots, you must shoot 20 shots in each position - prone, standing (off-hand), and kneeling. You must score 225 of a possible 600. (you may use any .22 rifle with a maximum retail value of \$235.)

OR

Precision Course: Using six A36 targets, shoot one shot at each record bull from a distance of 50 feet for a total of 60 shots. Of the 60 shots, shoot 20 shots in each position - prone, standing (offhand), and kneeling. You must score 420 of a possible 600. (You may use any .22 rifle.)

Make a tabletop display or presentation for your crew, another crew, a Cub Scout or Boy Scout unit, or another youth group about what you have learned about shooting sports. Include information about shooting sports in the summer and winter Olympics.
